Don't change your PICC line dressing alone. A dressing change should be a sterile process and sterile techniques should be applied. Either a caregiver, family

member, or home nurse should help you with your dressing change to maintain a sterile process throughout. Check your PICC Line dressing every day and change once a week. How to Change Your PICC Line Dressing - Mighty Well The end of the PICC line exits the body on the upper arm. The PICC will require a weekly flush with 10mls of sterile 0.9% saline and a dressing change at least weekly or as required. The procedure for flushing and dressing the PICC is outlined below. Central ... A peripherally inserted central catheter (PICC) is a tube, which is inserted into a vein in the upper arm, usually in the middle part. It is moved up into the large vein leading to your heart. A PICC can be placed in either arm. A PICC is made of a non-irritant material, for example, silicone, which means Peripherally Inserted Central Catheter (PICC) Booklet A PICC line is a long, thin, hollow, flexible tube called a catheter. It is put into one of the large veins of the arm, above the bend of the elbow. Then it is threaded into the vein until the tip is in a large vein just above the heart. There are no s/sx of any PICC related complications observed. The dressing is CDI. Pronounced “pick,” the line is a type of vascular access device that allows fluids and medications to be given to a patient. PICC Line Insertion, Care, Removal, and Risks A transparent dressing will cover the PICC line and Statlock® fixation device; the dressing will initially be

changed 24 hours after the procedure by the nurse caring for you. The dressing will then require changing every 7 days unless required more frequently due to soiling or the dressing becoming loose. If needle free connector is due to be changed, remove the old connector wipe the end of the line using a 2%Chlorhexidine impregnated wipes several times and allow to dry, then re apply a sterile needlefree connector • Attach syringe with 0.9% sodium chloride pull back to colour the saline with blood and then inject the flush using a push/ pause action, clamping as the last ml of solution is instilled into the catheter. It can stay in the body for weeks or months, alleviating the need to subject your veins to the numerous needle sticks

necessary if the PICC was not there. Following medical treatment, a patient's physician will decide when it is safe to remove the PICC line.
